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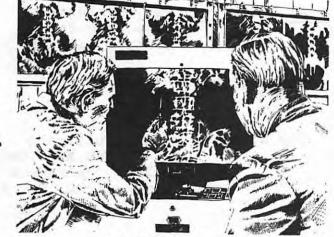

Post Convention Minutes:

Theresia Girresch, Secretary, read the post-convention minutes. The minutes were accepted as corrected.

Treasurers Report: Roy Jerden submitted a written report showing a balance of \$547.03 non including the 1981 convention. Treasurers report was accepted subject to audit.

January 16, 1982

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Legislation: Aona DeClue, Chairman, submitted an oral report reporting there are two bills to be considered as follows:908-licensing bill and 1095 registration bill with penalty.

On January 19th, 1982 members are to meet in the basement of the Capital Building at 9:00 pm for the hearing on these bills. Aona stated that there is still a need for more funds for lobbying.

Education: Plans are being made to have an educational seminar in Kirksville, Springfield and perhaps in St. Joseph. These would be a day and a helf seminar each. No outline was ready to be submitted.

Membership: We have 251 members: 110 active, 23 associate, 85 student, 10 non-associates, 2 supportive, 9 life, and 2 honorary.

Norman Hente suggested we send renewal notices to those previous members dropped from the mailing list. Aona commented that at one time second notices brought 30% response in renewals.

Public Relations: Bob Feldhaus submitted a written report. Since the convention, press releases have been sent on past events.

A press release form has been devised. Bob is in the process of doing the same for public service announcements for radio stations and developing a script for audio cassette and video cassette public service announcements. Districts should contact local publications two weeks prior to meetings for publication. Aona DeClue suggested an audio visual presentation for Jefferson City.

Nominating: A question was brought up regarding when the nominating ballots need to be mailed. The ballots have to be sent out and returned before the April Board meeting.

1st District: Dennis Sousley said that the 1st district has regular meetings with approximately 150 attending. Recruitements have increased.

3rd District: The district had a speaker on "Mobil Radiology". The attendance at their meetings has been good. They will have a speaker on "Digital" in the near future.

4th District: Bob Feldhaus submitted a written report. He reported on previous meetings and plans for future meetings. The 4th District has increased their meeting attendance. They are working hard on building their membership.

Convention 1981 Report: Jerry Schaumberg sent a written treasurery report with a check. The convention made \$6,278.40. The profit made was \$4,827.98.

Convention 1982 Report: Mary Wooldridge and Dennis Sousley submitted a proposed budget. There was discussion on the fees for the 1982 convention.

Roy Jerden moved that "the exhibit competition rules be amended as follows:

As time draws nearer for the 54th ASRT Annual Meeting, I should again like to remind you that a specific time has been planned on the pre-Board agenda to allow your direct participation. On Friday, July 2, 1982 from 3-5 pm, we invite you to bring specific requests or issues and address them to the Board. We would like to continue the open discussion that the Salt Lake City Annual Meeting provoked. A personal request from me is that you RSVP to let me know you are coming and I shall order the responses based on them reaching me.

Donations Continue

The Board of Directors of the Florida Society of Radiologic Technologists recently donated \$1,500. to ASRT for the express purpose of financing the upcoming issue of the Scanner. Thank you Florida on behalf of the ASRT Board of Directors and all members who will benefit from this important issue of the Scanner.

Financial Update

The Board of Directors and Executive Staff continue to closely monitor ASRT's financial situation. I am delighted to report to you that the most recent figures through February 1982 indicate that in both cash and overall operations, we are in a considerably improved position compared to February 1981. But, this still does not mean we are on totally stable ground, only that we are on the road to it. This current position must at least be maintained for us to be less concerned. The 1982-83 preliminary budget has been planned and will be presented to the Board as a balanced budget. The Board will be considering this budget during the week prior to the Annual Meeting in New Orleans. Remember, this is the budget for your organization and you have the right to see it and discuss it with the Board during the Annual Meeting. The past year's financial statements will also be available for your review.

National Radiologic Technology Week(NRTW) 1982

NRTW has been designated as November 7-13, 1982. Last year many affiliates and individual hospitals successfully informed the nation about our profession. This year a prospectus will be provided by ASRT to help you plan NRTW in your area. The ASRT Regional Directors will receive this information soon and will be able to share it with you during their visitations, so look for it.

Membership Renewals

It is still too early to tell the total impact of the dues increase on membership renewals. The bulk of ASRT renewals are sent out in mid-summer and resultant indications

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will not be available until Fall. From those renewals that have been sent out, the expected decrease is showing mostly in the student category. Renew your membership. Be one of those who is counted; don't be one who isn't.

The committee has provided input to the ASRT Director of Education for annual meeting continuing education programs for this group, presented two open forums to share thoughts related to job situations, published a Non Hospital information questionnaire in the Scanner, and began compilation of a list of those technologists specifically working in these areas.

Non Hospital technologists are often times not afforded the most modern facilities and they must learn to compensate and adjust technical factors to better serve the most important factor—THE PATIENT. They are a very integral part of the Health Care Team, and through efforts of this committee, they hope that they will be able to provide the information and education which will assist them in meeting their goals. New Publications Available

ASRT has two new publications which will be of value to members. A Guide to Development of an In-Service Education Program identifies the multiple factors which must be considered by the professional responsible for such a program. The Guide is intended to lead the novice through the procedure for establishing such a program within the radiology department. Legislative Update

The "Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1981" (P.L. 97-35) was signed into law by President Reagan on August 13, 1981. The Act promulgates federal minimum standards of certification and accreditation for radiologic technologists, as well as the development of medical radiation guidelines for use of radiation. The Department of Health and Human Services has the responsibility to see that both aspects of P.L. 97-35 are developed. The development of the credentialling standards have been assigned to the Division of Allied Health Professions of the Health Resources Administration. The Food and Drug Administration is to develop the radiation guidelines and ensure their adaptation by the federal agencies.

On Thursday, March 11 in Chicago, Illinois, the HRA held an "information" meeting and invited selected organizations and agencies to hear their plan of work. ASRT was represented at that meeting and will be providing input to HRA as they develop both the credentialling standards and the model statute that provides the framework for state based credentialling programs.

Just prior to that meeting on March 8th, the ASRT/ACR Legislative Task Force held a conference call to give final review to what should be the model legislation provided to both ASRT affiliates and ACR state chapters. That model legislation will provide an example for states to follow as state licensure develops in those states still not having their own licensing law. A most important point to remember is that this is "model" legislation and must be adapted to the individual states. This model was developed under the philosophy that it would serve as a guide since it is virtually impossible to design legislation that will meet requirements of all the states. The model legislation was developed from the mandates of the federal legislation, and therefore no conflicts with the federal document occur in this model.

ASRT will be providing direct input to state presidents and presidents elect at the ASRT Annual Meeting. Topics will be discussed at the Saturday meeting to which I referred earlier in this newsletter. It is hoped that more occasions for this information delivery will be possible. For certain I shall be discussing portions of the topic during a lecture at Quinnipiac College, Hamden, Conn. on Friday evening, April 23rd. Other definite times have yet to be finalized.

Radiation Control Directors Meeting

The Fourteenth Annual Meeting of the Conference of Radiation Control Program Directors, Inc., will be meeting the week of May 24th, 1982. I shall be representing ASRT at that meeting and participating on a panel. ASRT's viewpoint on technologist credentialling will be presented.

I hope the above information brings you up to date. Please pass this information along to your members and I hope to see you at the ASRT Annual Meeting in New Orleans.

1ST PLACE ESSAY-STUDENT

"Patient Attitude Survey", by Kimberly A. Bilbruck, student technolgist, Baptist Memorial Hospital, Kansas City, Mo.

A paramount issue in health care today is patient education. In order to provide exemplory patient care it is necessary to be concerned with educating the patient, as well as the rights of the patient. Informing the patient about exams requested by their doctors and why certain preps must be used are primary reasons for patiend education in Radiology.

The following is the patient's Bill of Rights as stated by the American Hospital Association for furthering effective patient care:

- "1) The patient has the right to considerate and respectful
 - 2) The patient has the right to obtain from his physician complete current information concerning his diagnosis, treatment, and prognosis in terms the patient can be reasonable expected to understand. When it is not medically advisable to give such information to the patient, the infomation should be made available to an appropriate person in his behalf. He has the right to know, by name, the physician responsible for coordinating his care.
- 3) The patient has the right to receive from his physician information necessary to give informed consent prior to the start of any procedure and/or treatment. Except in emergencies, such information for informed consent should include but not necessarily be limited to the specific procedure and/or treatment, the medically

significant risks involved, and the probably curation or incapacitation where medically significant alternatives for care or treatment exists, or when the patient requests information concerning medical alternatives, the patient has the right to such information. The patient also has the right to know the name of the person responsible for the procedure and/or treatment.

- 4) The patient has the right to refuse treatment to the extent permitted by law and to be infomed of his action.
- 5) The patient has the right to every consideration of his privacy concerning his own medical care program. Case discussion, consultation examination, and treatment are confidential and should be conducted discreetly. Those not directly involved in his care must have the permission of the patient to be present."

In order to comply with the mandate of this Bill of Rights, a committee was established involving personnel at various levels in the radiology department. Various tasks were assigned to each member of the committee. The student member (myself) was assigned the task of developing forms and compiling statistics for diagnostic radiology.

The committee felt that both anbulatory and house patients should be given written materials explaning preps, procedures, and duration of examinations.

Basic radiographer training requirements were also mentioned in the pamphlet. Also a pictorial drawing gave the patient a better understanding of the functions and locations of the various organs to be examined. After the criteria was established for the exams, pamphlets were printed. Color-coded paper was used to differentiate exams.

Pamphlets for CAT Scans, nuclear medicine, sonography, and diagnostic radiology were developed. Exams using contrast

media were of primary interest. For expediancy this paper will cover only diagnostic procedures.

The following is a true account of a patients' treatment and lack of any patient education:

A patient was admitted for severe abdominal pain, He is going to radiology in the morning for a barium enema, and can have nothing to eat and only water to drink. Another glass is brought in to him with prune juice and the nurse informs him that the orange juice machine is broken so he had to drink prune juice (like it or not). The nurse returns just about the time the patient feels sleepy and says she must give him an enema for the "exam in the morning". The patient is escorted to radiology in a wheelchair, after waiting in the hall for an untold period of time. technologist calls his name and escorts him into a room. Next the radiographer asks him to lay on the hard, cold, uncomfortable table. She briefly explains the procedure and leaves (possibly never to return!) the room. She returns carrying an ominous looking bag full of white fluid in one hand and an enema tip in the other.

CONFUSED?.....NO TERRIFIED!!

Due to the lack of patient education a patient was subjected to unnecessary "mental anguish" while in the radiology department. Can we as professionals allow this to continue?

Who is responsible for the distribution of patient information - is it the function of doctors, nurses, receptionists, or the responsibility of the radiology department personnel? Doctors cannot be held responsible for explaining exams in the radiology department, nor can nurses and receptionists be hald accountable. The technologist and/or radiologist should

be liable for procedure explanation. This is why the patient education committee was formed.

In order to act upon the recommendations of the patient education committee, pamphlets were distributed by radiology students to patients prior to the day of their exam. At this time the students gave a brief explanation of the exam and instructed the patient to read the pamphlets prior to the exam. A blank space was provided in the pamphlets for the patients questions and/or comments.

Following the examination patients were given a questionaire and asked to answer questions regarding the patient education materials received prior to the examinations.

The survey forms were distributed for three weeks. One hundred and fifty forms were distributed to both house patients and out-patients. Seventy five surveys were returned but only fifty were filled out completely. Some patients had conditions which prevented them from filling out the surveys and others refused to fill them out.

Data was collected from the completed surveys. Tables were designed to give the radiology personnel feedback on the patient information study.

(The survey questions, along with the percent indicated by the patients and the conclusions drawn from this information follow - editors note)

Did patient care services explain exam prior 30 0 10 20 40 to receiving materials? Conclusion: patient care service is below 50%, but patients are being informed prior to examinations.

Did your doctor explain examination? 70 0 0 30 Conclusion: A high number of doctors are not explaining the examinations to their patients.

How much did you know about the exam before receiving the materials? 50 0 30 0 20 Conclusion: 50% of the patients knew nothing about the examinations they were to have.

Were the materials thorough in explaining exam(s)?

10 0 30 20 40 Conslusion:majority of the patients responded positively about the pamphlet explanations.

Did the materials help relieve anxiety about the examination?

40 0 10 20 30 Conclusion: Less than one half the patients felt anxiety

Did the materials explain the reasons for preparations?

40 0 10 20 30 Conclusion: Pamphlets did not completely explain the reasons for preparations.

Did you know about the educational requirements for Radiologic Technologists? 50 0 40 10

"Simonds spoke for all of us when he outlined the following foundation values (esparre, 1970):

- 1. Patients shall be respected and cared for as human beings.
- Patients shall be recognized as having unique sociopsychological, culturel, and familar backgrounds relevent to their conditions.
- 3. Patients shall have the opportunity to obtain the information and guidance they need and shall have the support to help them use the information once it is obtained."²

In conclusion, more data must be accumulated to show either an increase or decrease in the patient education program. A longer time span may be beneficial to fully understand and compile data for this survey.

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American Society Of Radiologic Technologists Code Of Ethics

Preamble

This Code of Ethics is to serve as a guide by which Radiologic Technologists may evaluate their professional conduct as it relates to patients, colleagues, other members of the allied professions and health care consumers.

The Code of Ethics is not law but is intended to assist Radiologic Technologists in maintaining a high level of ethical conduct.

Therefore, in the practice of the profession, we the members of the American Iociety of Radiologic Technologists, accept the following principles:

Principle 1

Radiologic Technologists shall conduct themselves in a manner compatible with the dignity of their profession.

Principle 2

Radiologic Technologists shall provide services with consideration of human dignity and the uniqueness of the patient, unrestricted by considerations of age, sex, race, creed, social or economic status, handicap, personal attributes or the nature of the health problem.

Principle 3

Radiologic Technologists shall make every effort to protect all patients from unnecessary radiation.

Principle 4

Radiologic Technologists should exercise and accept responsibility for independent discretion and judgement in the performance of their professional services.

Principle 5

Radiologic Technologists shall judiciously protect the patient's right to privacy and shall maintain all patient information in the strictest confidence.

Principle 6

Radiologic Technologists shall apply only methods of technology founded upon a scientific basis and not accept those methods that violate this principle.

Principle 7

Radiologic Technologists shall not diagnose, but in recognition of their responsibility to the patient, they shall provide the physician with all information they have relative to radiologic diagnosis or patient management.

Principle 8

Radiologic Technologists shall be responsible for reporting unethical conduct and illegal professional activities to the appropriate authorities.

Principle 9

Radiologic Technologists should continually strive to improve their knowledge and skills by participaling in educational and professional activities and sharing the benefits of their altainments with their colleagues.

Principle 10
