A state of emergency exists in the state of Missouri:

The unknowing public is being needlessly subjected to unqualified persons performing their radiologic exams EVERY DAY! Not only are they being over exposed to radiation—they are receiving improper and sometimes delayed diagnosis for their conditions. This delay or misdiagnosis can cause an increase in treatment and recovery time and sometimes even death!

The Board of Directors of the Missouri Society of Radiologic Technologists has the following goals to achieve passage of legislation for the certification of all persons using ionizing radiation on human beings:

- Educate the technologists of our state on the importance of State Certification as it pertains to their role in the future of health care.
- Educate the general public on the importance of only "qualified" individuals performing radiologic procedures.
- Work closely with the Missouri Hospital Association, the State Legislature and any other organization that may be involved in getting the legislation passed.
- 4. Set up a phone network of technologists throughout the state. Use this network to "get the word out" quickly concerning all stages of the legislative process. Summary of the proposed legislation:

"This bill creates within the Division of Professional Registration the board of Ionizing Radiation Technology. The bill contains provisions pertaining to the make-up of the board, compensation of members, nomination and appointment procedures, terms of members, and meetings of the board. The board is required to establish standards for licensure, promulgate rules for the operation of the board, establish accreditation of schools and courses for radiation technology, and establish the appropriate continuing education for license renewal.

"The Division of Professional Registration is responsible for staffing of the board, giving board certified examinations, issuing certificates, establising and collecting reasonable fees, notify-

Sample letter to senators and representatives

Dear Senator/Representative ____

I am writing to ask that you support Senate Bill 103/House Bill 197. This legislation addresses the certification of persons administering ionizing radiation to humans. I feel this legislation is very important to the future of health care and will serve as protection for the patient/consumer in three important ways:

- First, and foremost, it will reduce the amount of over-exposure which can cause cancer, life shortening, and mutations of future generations.
- Second, it will help ensure that all patients receive the most accurate image to help in diagnosing their health care concerns.
 An accurate diagnosis is very dependent

upon the quality of the exam that the patient receives. A physician can only make an accurate diagnosis when the information he receives is both accurate and complete. Misdiagnosis can lead to unnecessary repeated exams, additional radiation exposure, undue suffering or even death.

3. Third, this legislation can help cut health care costs. By diagnosing disease in a timely and accurate manner, treatments can be timely and more effective. Failure to diagnosis disease in its earliest stage can only lead to more expensive treatment courses at a later date. Delayed or misdiagnosis also contributes to lawsuits for negligence.


There is an EMERGENCY in the State of Missouri!! The unknowing public is being needlessly subjected to unqualified persons performing their radiologic exams every day!



TECHNOLOGISTS: Urge Department of Health to release M.O.R.S.E.L.S. study immediately!

The Department of Health has been conducting a study over the last 24 months called M.O.R.S.E.L.S. This stands for MO Radiation Statistical Evaluation Longitudinal Study and it gathered data on the quality of radiologic exams done across the state of Missouri.

The preliminary data showed that for radiologic exams performed in clinics, physician, chiropractic and podiatrist offices the failure rate was more than 4 times that of exams performed in a hospital setting. It also showed that exams that were performed by non radiologic educated persons had a failure rate of 5 to 6 times more than that of exams performed by registered radiologic technologists.

This preliminary data proves what we all know—exams performed by unqualified persons are a danger to our patients. This study is being "held up in internal review" in the Department of Health at this time. I would like to encourage every technologist in the state to write to the Director of the Department of Health and to the Governor to urge them to release the M.O.R.S.E.L.S. study immediately. ing licensees of renewal dates, refusal and revocation of certificates, and the filing of complaints.

"The bill creates within the State Treasury the Board of Ionizing Radiation Technology Fund. All fees collected by the board will be placed in the fund, subject to appropriation. All expenses of the board and its employees will be paid from the fund."

The legislation has been proposed in the Senate by Rosann Bentley, Springfield, and is known as Senate Bill 103 (SB103). The legislation has also been proposed in the House of Representatives by Joan Barry and and Kathryn Hollingsworth, St. Louis, and is known as House Bill 197 (HB197). Copies of these bills can be obtained from your local Representative or Senator or on the World Wide Web at www.state.mo.us.

As of press time, SB103 has been assigned to the Financial and Government Organization Committee. The Honorable William "Lacy" Clay, 4th Senate District, is chairman and Joe Maxwell, 18th Senate District, is vice chairman.

Please make a special note to write to the members of these committees and urge them to vote this legislation "out of committee" and to the entire Senate or House of Representatives.

When you are writing or calling your Representative or Senator please be sure and name the bill you want them to support. A personal letter receives the best response. Here are some facts you may include:

FACT: Over 90% of all radiation the general public receives is from medical x-ray examinations. Less than 10% of all radiation received is from nuclear power plants, nuclear fallout or research accidents.

FACT: There is currently no law in Missouri that protects the consumer-patient from unqualified operators of x-ray machines, except in the area of mammography.

FACT: It is estimated that 40% of the people administering ionizing radiation have NOT received any formal education in Radiologic Technology—this includes physicians, nurses, lab techs...

FACT: Misdiagnosis is a major concern related to unqualified persons performing radiologic exams. Films that are of low quality due to incorrect exposure or poor positioning result in anatomy or disease processes not being imaged. A physician can only make a proper diagnosis with a quality film!
